IMPACT OF COVID-19 CROATIA



- Croatian Institute for Public Health cases of Covid-19 (6.10.2020)
- Total cases: 18,084 Recovered: 16,192 Deaths: 304
- Paediatric: around 500 children under 19 years old
- 6.10.2020: 203 children cases, 4000 children in quarantine
- Newest reccomendations and instructions for Health Department given in September 2020
- Everyday life in Croatia takes place with new epidemiological measures
- Health professionals mandatory Covid testing prior coming to work, if they feel any symptoms or contact with Covid positive person
- Lack of Intensive Care nurses in Respiratory Covid Centres help from nurses from other specialisations

May 2021.



- Total number: 350 997, death 7764
- 4871 hospitalizated patients, at intensive care 166 (may 18.)
- No data for children but now we have more post covid complications in childhood (headache, dizzines, double images, multisystem inflammatory syndrome in children,)
- School online, children are not vaccinated
- Student vaccinations began
- May 14.2021. Croatia vaccinated a million people

October 2021.



- Total number: 408 699, death 8678
- 779 hospitalizated patients, at intensive care 95 (october 04.)
- School live, vaccination of children age >12 years
- October 2021. Croatia vaccinated more than 60% people

May 2022.



• COVID 19:

- We are trying to live "normally"!
- A much smaller number of covid positive individuals, mostly with a mild simptomes!
- All measures are abolished except health institutions masks are required!

May 2022.



Impact of war in Ukraine:

- 16000 total number of refugees (28.4.2022.)
- 650 number of refugees employed in Croatia
- 1291 number of children in educational institutions
- accommodated in transit, collective or individual accommodations

October 2022.



COVID 19

- about 65% of the population is vaccinated
- less then 25% of children is vaccinated
- post-covid clinics for children in hospitals
- currently about 4500 covid +, 500 per day, mostly mild clinical picture
- 90% healthcare workers vaccinated, 70% recovered from covid

UKRAINE



- children from Ukraine are cared in clinical departments according to the decision of the Ministry of Health (full service)
- most of them already have a competent team from health care
- currently around 18 000 refugees, 6400 are children





Impact of COVID-19 and Ukrainian crisis in Iceland update – October 2022

Iceland

Impact on children and families of the war in the Ukraine

- About 1500 refugees from Ukraine since the beginning of the war It is estimated that 4000 refugees will have arrived in Iceland in the end of 2022
- There is a shortage of accomodation and for many families there is a delay that they get legal residence If the family does not have legal residency in Iceland the children can not go to schools by Icelandic law

Impact of long Covid

• There are no official numbers regarding long covid on children in Iceland – most of the children diagnosed are > 12 years old

Covid vaccintaion uptake

- About 60% of children in the age group 5 11 years (40% with 2 vaccinations)
- Over 80% of children in the age group 12 15 years (78% with 2 vaccinations)

Impact of workload on the workforce, exhaustion and stress

- Increased workload and exhaustion after Covid especially in the adult population
- Nurse staffing in the childrens hospital in Iceland is far better than in the adult hospital
 which is in a crisis at the moment many nurses have resigned because of extreme
 workload especially in the emergency department

DENMARK





COVID

- There is a small increase in covid infections, primarily with mild symptoms.
- The health sector is mainly focusing on long term effects. Those who are infected describe symptoms such as brain fog, fatigue, concentration difficulties, reduced life quality.
- Revaccination is offered from October 2022.





UKRAINE

- There are limited numbers of Ukrainian refugees in the Danish hospitals.
- Ukrainian refugees do not put a significant burden on the Danish society.







Impact of workload on the workforce, exhaustion and stress.

- There is a great lack of registered nurses in Danish hospitals in general.
- Nurses both newly qualified as well as experienced nurses are leaving jobs at hospitals.
- Wards close due to nurse shortage.
- The number of applicants for nursing schools has fallen by 28 % within the last year.





Topics: Children from the Ukraine

In July 2022 National guidelines were set up for the Dutch Paediatricians (Nederlandse Vereniging voor Kindergeneeskunde (NVK)., concerning Children from the Ukraine. This document was made by an Expert group in name of the Expert group (Global Child Health).

Is financed by Regeling voor Ontheemden uit Oekraïne (RMO)

These guidelines concern for example:

- Heel prick screening for all babies < 6 months because in the Ukraine they were only screened on 4 diseases.
- Low grade surveillance and fast diagnostics on signs of HIV., Tuberculosis, hepatitis C and HIV. In Ukraine higher prevalence of all mentioned.
- Children of Ukranian parents that are born in The Netherlands receive the BCG vaccination around the age of 2 months.
- Help is given conform the intervention pyramid for psychiatric and psychosocial care for under aged Children. The youth healthcare (JGZ) starts with the intake.
- Culture sensitive care is an important part of the available and given care. Hereby the use of translators and experts on culture sensitive communication are the key persons. The National expert team (PHAROS) helps if needed.



Topics: Children from the Ukraine

Now 13.000 children attend basis school or High school.

Difficulty in schools:

- Many children move around leave to go back to the Ukraine.
- New ones come unannounced.
- The children were supposed to get 1 year of intermediate schooling but due to shortage of staff the end up in regular classrooms with Dutch children.
- Many Ukrainian children want to follow the online classes given by the Ukrainian government otherwise they will not get their National diploma.



Corona update Paediatrics 2022 Netherlands

In July 2022 there are National protocols and decision trees concerning all ages. The protocol is set up for daycare centers, childcare in private homes, childcare after school and in the elementary schools. The decision tree concerns all relevant topics like what to do with symptoms and which symptoms, concerning ventilation in places or for example transport etc etc.

from age 0 up to group 8 primary school


By means of this decision tree you will be able to determine whether a child should or should not stay at home.

- 1. Start at the grey block that applies to the child and follow the questions in the prescribed sequence.
- . Do not just look at one or two separate questions; this may lead to an incorrect result.
- 3. The outcome of the decision tree is not valid for brothers and/or sisters. The decision tree has to be followed separately for each child

- No. Healthcare could see this coming years ago but have done very little to make the nursing career more attractive and give better wages.
- Now hospitals have to close beds and wards.
- They think they can solve the problem by recruiting nurses from developing countries.









From February 24 to May, 22,788 Ukrainian students are welcomed:


- 5,060 in Kindergarten,
- 10,399 in Primary School,
- 5,226 in Lower Secondary
- 2,103 in Upper Secondary.

21% is concentrated in Lombardy, 12% in Emilia-Romagna (North) and 11% in Campania (South).

MONTHLY QUOTA OF NEW ARRIVALS

During the month of August 2022, 2,208 UAMs entered Italian territory

27.3% from Egypt 18.2% from Tunisia 12.3% from Afghanistan 7.7% from Pakistan

Notably, UAMs' sea arrivals during August 2022 represent about 58% of all the minors that were reported entering Italian territory.






- Focus on school age (0-19 years):
- Since the beginning of the epidemic,
 - COVID-19 infection 4,577,377, of which 23,275 hospitalized, 518 hospitalized in intensive care and 72 deceased.
- The percentage of cases reported in the school age population compared to the rest of the population (14.9% vs 11.1%).
- In the last week, 25% of school-age cases were diagnosed in children under 5 years, 39% in the 5-11 age group, 36% in the 12-19 age group.
- New recommendation? Now no mask at school; to improve immunization among children and young persons
- Scientific debate about immunization among children 5-11 years old.

Children with comorbidities and severe immunocompromising conditions should be offered vaccination- WHO 11 August 2022









Italian Society of Paediatrics, Recomendations to check Long Covid

To visit all children and adolescents with a suspected or proven diagnosis of Covid after 4 weeks of the acute phase of the infection

Shortage of Nurses in Italy

- Yes, the problem involves both pediatric and adult service.
- During Covid, the nurse shortage is especially for private Hospital, Older or long term people residence. The nurses are exhausted
- This is an old problem.
- The problem is how to make the nursing career more attractive and give better wages. For 2022-2023 Academy year -9,2% of test subscription !!! (especially in North regions)
- FNOPI is proposing a new educative system oriented to Advanced Nursing and economical recognition
- New problem! Nurses from developing countries are recruiting but at this moment, without the Title recognition and the duty of Nursing Order subscription



- Staff shortages in Children's Nursing, increased number of nurses leaving the profession. Recent evidence suggest
 40,000 Nurses have left 2020-2021 (43% only retired) and only 4,000 more recruited (n=44,000) which will be
 inadequate for future proofing. This is said to be almost DOUBLE from pre-pandemic. So Service models being
 changed due to limited workforce rather than what is needed to provide effective care. Some recruitment of generic
 nurses into children's nursing services.
